2.00pm Visit to Knedlington Old Hall, (near Howden) Guided Tour by Phil Thomas Knedlington Old Hall is a small East Yorkshire gentry house, built between 1649 and c.1660 for a locally prominent Puritan family on a very ancient site. It may be no coincidence that its construction neatly spanned the years of the English Commonwealth. Most unusually for a non-aristocratic house in the region, it is built in a high-status and expensive mixture of brick (then a relatively unfamiliar material) and limestone to an advanced square, double-pile plan, detailed with care and theatricality. A little later in the seventeenth century the interiors were enriched. At the same time, the extensive and unusual farmstead complex around the Hall began to take its present form and a new entrance gate was constructed.

In 1964 the Old Hall was ruthlessly 'modernised' in the inappropriate materials generally used at the time. The present owners have worked to undo almost all of these damaging changes in breathable materials, and to create a setting suitable for a prominent seventeenth century house. They are about to begin repairing and conserving the most significant outbuilding in the farmstead complex; dovecote, stable and а scullerv probably built in the 1770s.

Directions for visitors

Knedlington Old Hall is in the hamlet of Knedlington, just one mile west of Howden in East Yorkshire. DN14 7EU From the East:

Take the A614 towards Goole. Ignore the turnings to Howden, and at a miniroundabout turn right onto the A63 towards Selby. Follow the A63 for one mile and at the first crossroads turn left towards Asselby and Barmby. You are now in Knedlington. The Old Hall is on the right in half a mile, at the far end of the hamlet. The drive is immediately before the house.

From the north:

Take the A19 south to Barlby Roundabout. Turn left (signposted M62 E, M18, Hull Howden A63) and follow the A63 for about 8 miles. Drive past the first turning for Howden, and the road will bear to the right. At the next small crossroads, turn right towards Asselby and Barmby. You are now in Knedlington. The Old Hall is on the right in half a mile, at the far end of the hamlet. The drive is immediately before the house.

Via the M62:

Leave the motorway at exit 37 for Howden. After the motorway sliproad, turn left onto the A614 at the next roundabout. In one mile turn right at the mini-roundabout onto the A63 towards Selby. Follow the A63 for another mile and at the first crossroads turn left towards Asselby and Barmby. You are now in Knedlington. The Old Hall is on the right in half a mile, at the far end of the hamlet. The drive is immediately before the house.

She joined the Archaeology Department at the University of York in 1991 and there she developed both Buildings Archaeology and Heritage Management as postgraduate specialisms. After a period in management she retired in 2015 and returned to her listing patch and beyond to update Pevsner's magisterial volume. This lecture will explain how she did it.

Visit to Stamford Bridge

On 19 August 2023, a hot day. members of the Society visited Stamford Bridge, the site of what was probably the most important battle in our part of the world. The purpose of our visit was to look at the Stamford Bridge Tapestry and to walk to the (conjectured) battlefield.

Our base for the day was the Old Railway Station and Stationmasters House. This is now the Old Station Club, which incorporates a small gallery -"Platform 66"- in which to display the tapestry. Starting with a welcome coffee and cake, we settled down to hear a brief account of the Battle of Stamford Bridge on 25 September 1066, when two men competed for the throne of England following the death of Edward the Confessor, They were Harald Sigurdsson (known later as Hardrada), King of Norway and Harold Godwinson, earl of Wessex. Hardrada and his men rowed their longships up the Number and the Ouse with their horses and weapons. With them was Earl Tostig Godwinson. Earl Harold was in York and was willing to negotiate. Hardrada and Tostig were over-confident but once the English had forded the River Derwent, a battle took place on the rising ground and Hardrada and Tostig were killed. We all know what happened later! Earl Harold sped back to the south coast and was defeated by the third contender tor the throns Duke William of Normandy, at Hastings on 14 October.

Hastings is commemorated in the famous Bayeux Tapestry. Stamford Bridge now has its own tapestry to tell its own part of the story.

The Stamford Bridge Tapestry

The tapestry was conceived by a group of local people in 2015, just before the 950th anniversary of the Battle of Hastings in 1066. It was designed by Chris Rock, a graphic and historical artist. It was inspired by the Bayeux Tapestry but is not a copy since it depicts the events in Stamford Bridge. There were about 24 volunteer stitchers, including women born in Australia, Zimbabwe and New Zealand, led by a professional embroiderer. Not all were very experienced.

The tapestry is embroidered on an offwhite linen twill (costing over £100 per metre!) and uses 13 shades of highquality wool. Bayeux stitch was used as a filler for large areas. The whole process seems to have been social and collaborative. The embroidery is set out on 12 main panels, each measuring 1.2 m. by 0.6 m. The panels were completed In 2021 - during "lockdown" the women embroidered at home. The tapestry is now displayed round the walls of "Platform 66", at eye level, where it can be studied closely.

The Battle

After an excellent buffet lunch, we set out on a guided walk along the old railway track and over a viaduct high above the Derwent (Wonderful views over the area). Then down to the river and into the village centre across THE BRIDGE. We paused at the Battle Memorial of a basestone and obelisk on the steep slope where the Norwegians formed their shieldwall; there are plaques inscribed in English and Norwegian

"Slaget med Stamford bru ble utkjemret i disse trakter den 25 September 1066"

"Around here" - the area of the battlefield is uncertain but up the hill is Battleflats, where a large boulder in a little grassy field is the only marker. It is not easy to find - on the edge of a modem cul-de-sac of large houses. The Norwegian survivors were allowed by the victorious Earl Harold to flee this way to reach their boats at Riccall. Hardrada's body was taken back to Norway and Tostig's to York Minster.

The Stamford Tapestry is a beautiful piece of embroidery and well worth a visit. "Platform 66" is open on Tuesdays and Saturdays. We had a most enjoyable day thanks to Pam Martin's thorough preparations.

We had a super, buffet lunch at a café on High Street and then were shown around the buildings by Austen Redman. I was wearing a different hat then, that of the Yorkshire Vernacular Building Study Group, and loved seeing all the great 16th-19th century buildings crowded along High Street. The icing on the cake was the chance to see inside an 18th century building and look around the gardens. What a second treat.

Talk on the History and

Practice of Bookbinding

Saturday, 21st October saw me in the East Riding College in Beverley for a talk and demonstration by Colin Tatman. Again we had a speaker who is at the top of his field and his talk was just up my street, as I am a print-maker, as well as a local historian.

The Power Point demonstration covered the fascinating history of book-binding, from the first papyrus scrolls, as would be found in the Great Library of Alexandria, through to the most recent techniques in book-binding. There were amazing examples taken from books held in the British Museum, amongst other places; including the earliest coloured editions, as in the Lindisfarne Gospels, and later techniques to add illustrations in books.

Such a wealth of knowledge shown to us and finishing with a demonstration of how the leaves in books are sewn together. Altogether, a fascinating time was had.

A Visit to Hedon

Catholic Church

It was quite a humid afternoon when we met up on Friday 5th May with our guide Tony Hay in the back garden of Hedon Catholic church. We were given a very interesting talk on the origins of the building and further history. In 1801 Fr Joseph Swinburne arrived in Hedon and was a newly ordained priest from Ushaw College based temporarily at Crook Hall, Durham, and the church we see today was discretely built on Baxtergate and completed in 1803. A group of four priests had bought a plot of land on the west side of Baxtergate which included a house,



garden and outhouses from one Matthew Ellis, a weaver who had lived in what was to become the Presbytery with his wife and 8 daughters. The pre-emancipation church of St. Mary & St. Helen was built unobtrusively in a simple brick design, behind the house, in a non-conformist style of chapel. The Parish grew from a 'secret' church established at Nuthill, between Preston and Lelley. Sir Henry Constable supported priest Joseph Metcalfe in 1672 when there were a total of 214 people registered as Catholics in 5 parishes of Holderness, the highest number in any area of the East Riding. Laws were enforced but widely ignored if Catholics were discreet. James Watson, priest in 1733 was living with the Metcalfe family at Nuthill when new tenants, the Champneys, also Catholics, took over the farm. Fr. Watson was no longer welcome to stav because of his 'niceness' meaning he was too fussy! During 1778 the first Catholic Relief Act came into being. In 1849 Fr. Francis Trappes was in Hedon and witnessed an epidemic of Cholera killing 50 inhabitants between August and October of that year. He was replaced by Fr. Robert Tate, D.D. an academic, later becoming President of Ushaw College, who described Hedon as 'a rather out of the way spot'.

Inside the church were many interesting features including the window on the West side of the church depicting the meeting of Mary Magdalen and Jesus after the Resurrection and bearing the words 'Touch Me Not'. It was the only window to remain undamaged by the airship attack on the Methodist Church that had stood opposite! In 1897 the pictures around the altar apse depicting the twelve apostles were put in place and the fresco of The Crowning of Mary in Heaven in the half dome above were completed by Henry Immencamp of Munich who later also did much of the decoration of St Charles Borromeo Church in Hull

City Centre. We wandered up into the balcony which gave a lovely view of the inside the building.

Our delightful afternoon ended with a short walk to Hedon Museum where we were kindly provided with tea and biscuits, and we were able wander around to see the very interesting display boards.

Yorkshire Heritage Summit

Building on the success of last year's Yorkshire Heritage Summit in Saltaire, the bigger 2024 summit will take place in the historic city of Hull on Saturday 11th and Sunday 12th May.

The event brings together local and regional organisations concerned with promoting or protecting every aspect of Yorkshire's heritage, to showcase their work and the importance of Yorkshire's unique culture, history and landscape.

It comprises a public exhibition that's free to attend, a symposium with keynote speakers and presentation of the Harry Gration History Prize as well as a number of heritage events including guided tours of Hull's historic centre and surrounding area.

The Yorkshire Heritage Summit is organised by The Yorkshire Society and is the brainchild of author and environmental campaigner Colin Speakman. First held in 2022 it has quickly established itself as an important annual event for the largely voluntary heritage sector and thousands are expected to visit the event in 2024.

Colin explains "Heritage is as much about our future as about our past and Yorkshire has such a rich and fascinating heritage. The Yorkshire Society want to bring heritage organisations, their volunteers and members of the public together, to network, celebrate and promote their work with one united voice".
