Book Reviews

David Crouch (ed.) A History of the County of York: East Riding Volume X, Part 2 Howden Town and Liberty (Boydell and Brewer, 2020) ISBN 978-1-90435-653-0. pp.168 illus.£95

This second volume completes the study of Howden township and liberty, which form a complex region involving competing and anomalous iurisdictions. Formerly one of the two liberties of the Bishop of Durham, it is examined along with Wallingfen, which back in Roman times had formed part of an inlet of the Humber at the feet of the Wolds. Though not a part of Howdenshire it offered important resources the surrounding to townships. The rich pasture, fish, game, peats, rushes, reeds and turves, of Wallingfen were managed by an elected body of gentry and yeomen outside either ecclesiastical or roval control. Distancing from the usual controls imposed by royal officials or clergy can be seen in other aspects of the East Ridings of Yorkshire, and particularly in Hull where until the construction of the first enclosed dock. opened 1778, there was no proper legal quay for the accurate assessment of duties. Hull though it had no approved assay office had its own system of marking for silver and gold which persisted until the early 18th century without any external regulation.

Frequent inundations from the Ouse and the making of banks and dykes in response are recorded as early as 1274. In 1445-6 a staith was completed at Howdendyke revetted with stapled faggots and detailed records survive for the reigns of Henry 8 and Elizabeth I. These staiths were a hazard to navigation and also affected the rivers behaviour, the tidal bore, known as the Aegir, associated with the equinoctial high tides was exaggerated wherever the river narrowed. The lead wave could reach a metre in height and

resulted in the scouring of the banks at the bends in the river. Maintenance was expensive and repairs to the Wet Flood Staith in 1531 required no less than 80 oak trees,600 timber piles, 4000 brushwood faggots, and 800 corded bundles of thorn.

The Liberty of Howden was a detached estate of the Bishopric of Durham and the bishops officers eventually established their authority after various disputes with representatives of the crown during the 13th century. The area known as Bishopsoil provided some 4000 acres of common land to the north of Howden township, and was enclosed in 1777.

There was a twice yearly Bishops court and the remains of one the court buildings survives next the Langlev Gate, but the old Moot Hall was demolished in the early nineteenth century. The Bishop's manor house survives and the parish church of St Peter, Howden Minster, is an impressive reminder of the power and influence of the see of Durham, though much reduced from its collegiate form. After the Reformation, and the return of royal authority to Howdenshire, the choir and chapter house fell into disrepair. though the latter was reroofed in 1984 to preserve the stonework.

The settlement of Howden apparently originated as a river landing on the lower Derwent and river transport via the Ouse was crucial to its existence, both for movement of goods and people. Until the middle of the 19th

century most riverbank settlements had ietties and Howdendyke became a thriving river port. Roads access was poor, and before 1800 it was necessary to use a ferry at Bubwith in order to reach the Wolds and Beverley while the Bishops manor controlled a ferry between Howdendyke and Hook. It was 1929 before the development of a modern highways system linked by bridges was achieved. A railway connection had however established by the construction of the Hull-Selby railway in 1840. This encouraged the development of the Howden horse fairs in an area with some fame in the 18-19th centuries for horse-breeding.

Howden claimed a moment on the national in 1924 when the former Royal Naval Air Service airfield was acquired by the Airship Guarantee Company. Despite the successful flight of the R100 from Howden, designed by Barnes Wallis, inventor of the 'bouncing bomb', the loss in 1929 of the R101, an airship designed by a government team, resulted in the cancellation of the entire national airship programme.

The volume includes Welton and Welton Soke, Welton cum Melton, and is divided into sections describing landscape, settlement, land ownership, economic history, river defence and drainage, social and religious history, and local government.
